Keeping African women in social reproduction roles: a systematic qualitative review of

literature on post-FTLRP Zimbabwe

Abstract

The capitalist sytem has been underwritten by unpaid social reproduction labour mostly provided

by women. This article deploys social reproduction theory (SRT) to systematically review

scholarly literature on Zimbabwe's fast track land reform programme (FTLRP) published since

2011. Research evidence indicates reasonable improvement on women's access to and control of

land, but whether or not FTLPRP led to a more egalitarian division of social reproduction labour

remains to be researched. The paper concludes by proposing a new research agenda on the shifting

boundaries between workplace and home, paid and unpaid labour, for women on post-FTLRP

farms.
